# THE POWER OF PETITIONS

## The Mission

*The mission of the Village Development Committees (VDCs) is to empower rural communities to transition from passive beneficiaries to active stakeholders in their own development by bridging the gap between grassroots needs and government administration. This mission is driven by a systematic effort involving the formal documentation of grievances, strategic multi-level advocacy with officials—ranging from the Sarpancha to the District Collector—and persistent follow-up to ensure accountability. By transforming community demands into tracked, actionable petitions, the VDCs have successfully moved critical projects from "Pending" to "Success," resulting in tangible outcomes like the construction of all-weather roads, the electrification of Anganwadi centers, and the initiation of vital land-rights verification through the Revenue Department.*

# PROVIDING QUALITY EDUCATION THROUGH AFTER SCHOOL STUDY CENTRE & ADULT LITERACY



- 7 Community Educators (graduates, local residents) selected to run 7 ASSCs - ensures community ownership.
- Centres operate 2 shifts/day, supporting 75 children (40 boys, 35 girls) with structured learning, English skills & extracurriculars.
- Adult Literacy Program: 93 adults enrolled -
  - 53 (58%) can sign names.
  - 38 (41%) can read/write and understand signboards.
  - South Sahi achieved 100% signature literacy.
- Educators work with both children & adults, fostering intergenerational learning culture.

Regular assessments were conducted to monitor children's progress, ensuring learning targets were met. The centres also integrated extracurricular activities like Yoga, General Knowledge tests, Dance, and Arts & Culture, which improved teacher-student interaction. These combined efforts created a dynamic learning environment, making education more engaging and effective for children.

# Improving Children's Health & Cultural Development through Extracurricular Sessions

The FFVDP team, in collaboration with community educators, strengthened after-school study centres by integrating structured extracurricular activities to support children's physical health, cultural expression, and social skills. Children actively participated in dance practice, yoga sessions, sports activities, peer learning exercises, and weekly/monthly Q&A sessions, creating a balanced learning environment beyond academics.

These regular engagements improved physical fitness, confidence, teamwork, and cultural awareness among children while enhancing attendance and participation levels at the centres. The initiative promotes holistic child development by combining education with health, creativity, and interactive learning practices.

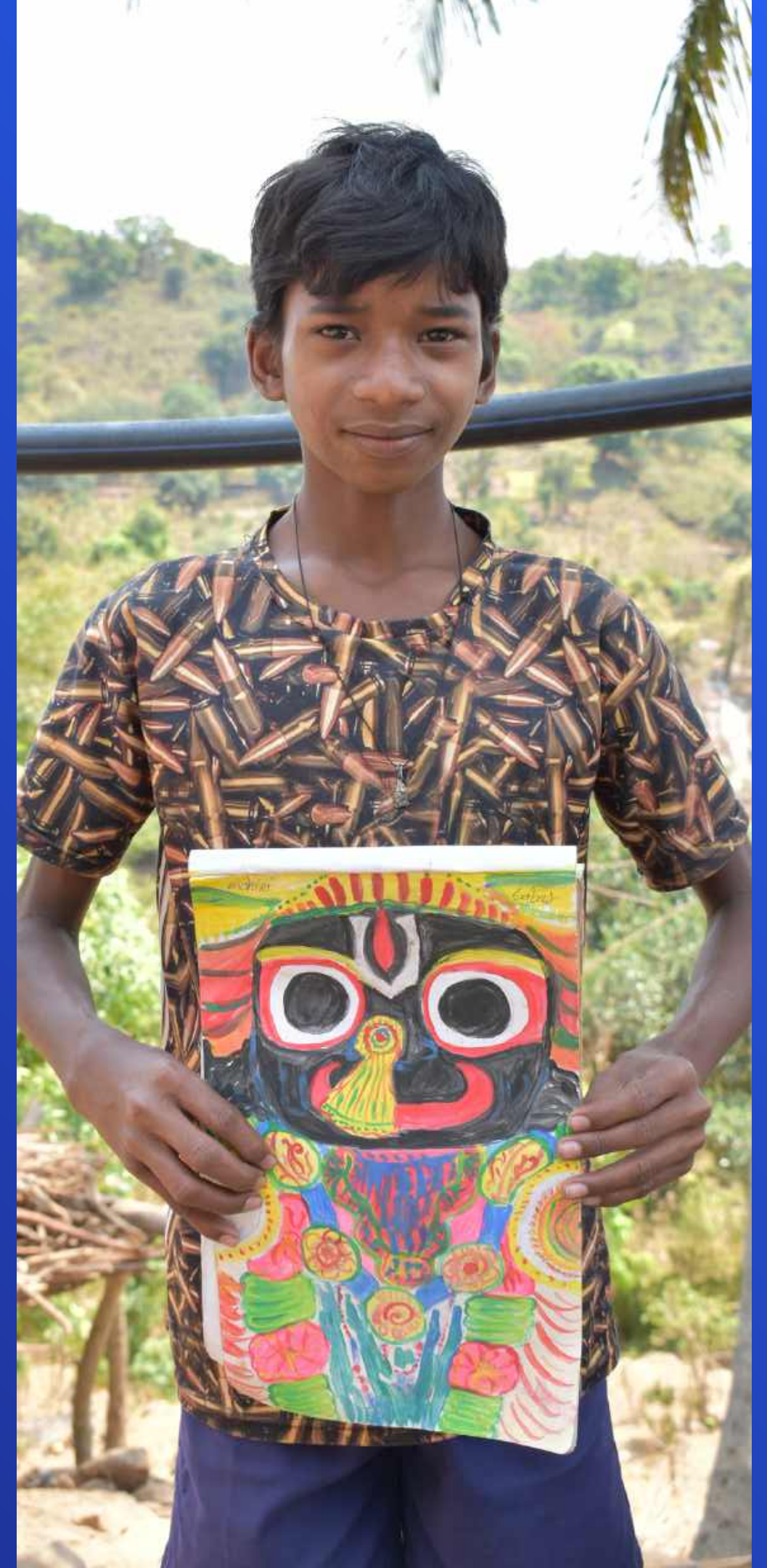

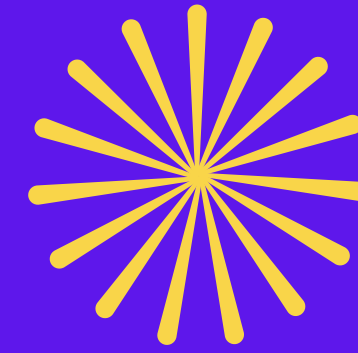
# Enhancing & Supporting Children's Extracurricular Skills

FFVDP provides children the freedom and space to explore and strengthen their preferred skills, including singing, dancing, drawing, creative arts, and other talents. Through guided practice sessions, children are encouraged to express themselves confidently and develop their individual interests.

To boost confidence, motivation, and morale, FFVDP organizes small competitions, talent showcases, and group activities at the centre level. These initiatives help children build self-esteem, creativity, teamwork, and future aspirations, contributing to their overall personal and cultural development.

# ENABLING SKILL EDUCATION THROUGH ITI SUPPORT

To prevent school dropout and promote employable skills, CCD successfully facilitated the enrolment of three vulnerable students from different villages into ITI skill training courses at Centurion University of Technology and Management, R. Sitapur. **Beneficiaries & Trades:**

- **Ajay Bhuyan (Singubhuyan Sahi) - Electronics Trade**
- **Satyananda Bhuyan (Sargi Sahi) - Fitter Trade**
- **Dharmendra Bhuyan (South Sahi) - Fitter Trade**

**Students were identified through village-level assessments based on interest, academic potential, and socio-economic status, ensuring 100% transparency with the involvement of parents, community leaders, and school authorities. CCD coordinated admissions, fee support, and orientation with the university. As a result, all three students are now formally enrolled, continuing education beyond school and gaining market-relevant technical skills, significantly reducing dropout risk and strengthening their future livelihood opportunities. Quarterly follow-ups and mentoring will ensure course completion and skill development.**



# Empowering a Child through Financial Support

Through timely community action and FFVDP facilitation, Ranjit Shabar, a student from a highly vulnerable household, was successfully linked to the State Government Sponsorship Scheme. Despite losing his mother early and living with a disabled father, Ranjit remained committed to education, walking 8 km daily to attend school.

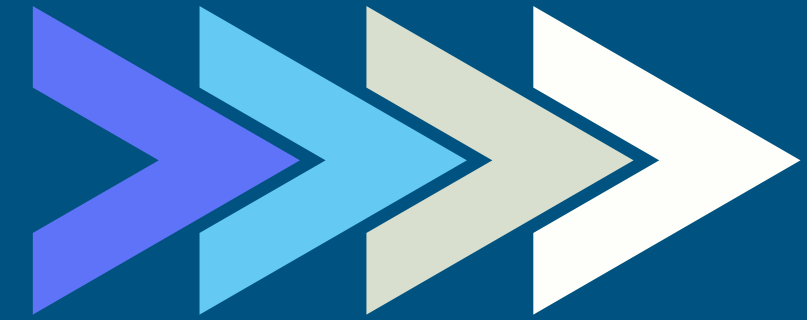
Identified during a VDC meeting and verified through a home visit, FFVDP coordinated with the DCPO and CWC and completed all documentation within 3 months. Ranjit now receives ₹4,000 per month for 3 years (₹1,44,000 total support), ensuring 100% school attendance, access to learning materials, improved household stability, and the elimination of dropout risk. This success highlights the impact of community leadership, structured government support, and sustained follow-up in transforming a child's educational journey.

# FROM DROPOUT TO SKILLED ELECTRICIAN MAKING



After being a college dropout for 5 years due to financial hardship and family responsibilities, Ajay Bhuyan migrated for work and later returned to his village with limited livelihood options. Through counselling and motivation by the CCD team, Ajay enrolled in a free 3-month vocational computer training program under FFVDP–Skill India convergence at Jeerango. Despite severe financial constraints, he walked 15 km one way (30 km daily) to attend 2-hour daily classes, showing exceptional determination.

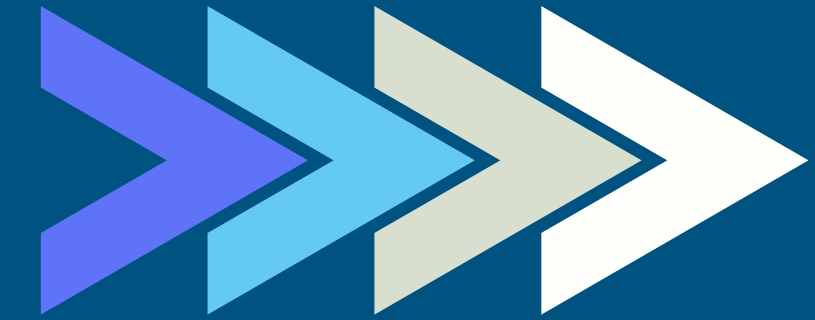

FROM GRASSROOT LEVEL TO THE MAINSTREAM

Recognizing his struggle, CCD provided immediate transport support, enabling regular attendance and successful course completion. Building on this progress, Ajay received ₹10,000 FFVDP scholarship support and was facilitated to enroll in the Electrician trade (ITI) at Centurion University of Technology and Management, R. Sitapur. Of the ₹30,000 annual course fee, ₹19,500 government scholarship was mobilized, and ₹12,000 hostel support arranged through government provisions. Today, Ajay attends classes regularly, uses modern training facilities, and is steadily progressing toward a sustainable technical career, becoming a role model for rural youth in the community.

# From School Dropout to Skilled ITI Trainee



Satyananda Bhuyan comes from a single-parent family and dropped out of school after Class 10 due to financial hardship. Following the death of his father, his mother became the sole earning member, working as a daily wage labourer, while Satyananda also worked to support the family. As a result, he remained out of the education system for nearly 5 years, with no stable livelihood prospects.

FROM GRASSROOT LEVEL TO THE MAINSTREAM

Under the FFVDP intervention, CCD identified Satyananda as a vulnerable dropout youth and provided regular counselling, career guidance, and parental motivation. With ₹10,000 FFVDP scholarship support, he was facilitated to rejoin education and enrolled in ITI – Fitter Trade at Centurion University of Technology and Management (CUTM), R. Sitapur. Of the ₹25,000 annual course fee, ₹19,500 was covered through government scholarship, and ₹12,000 hostel support was arranged through government provisions. Satyananda now attends classes regularly, shows improved technical skills and confidence, and is progressing toward a stable, skilled livelihood, demonstrating the transformative impact of targeted educational support.

# EDUCATIONAL SUPPORT THROUGH JOSADA SCHEME

Under the FFVDP project, CCD successfully linked three vulnerable students from economically disadvantaged families to the Odisha Government's JOSADA Scheme, ensuring continued access to education and reducing dropout risk.

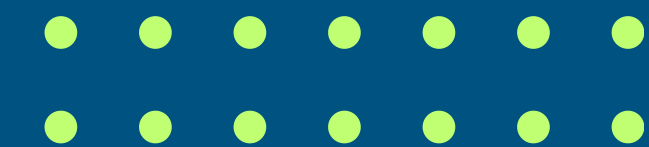

- ● Identified during education-focused awareness programmes, the students were supported through end-to-end facilitation by CCD, in coordination with DCPU & CWC, Gajapati. Parents, VDC members, and community leaders actively participated in documentation, verification, and CWC production. As a result, 100% of identified students were successfully enrolled under JOSADA, each receiving
- ● ₹10,000 per annum, ensuring school continuity, reduced financial stress, and minimized dropout risk. Follow-up support is planned to
- ● ensure renewal and sustained educational progress.



# Youth Talent Recognized at District Level



A group of local youth performers showcased their cultural talent during the Summer Camp organized under the FFVDP initiative. Their performance highlighted traditional art forms and cultural expressions, drawing strong appreciation from the audience and dignitaries present.

Impressed by their performance, the District Sanitation Coordinator (DSC) selected the youth group to represent the block at the district-level talent competition, “Bikshit Bharat Mela.” The group performed successfully at the district platform and was officially recognized and awarded for preserving and showcasing their traditional cultural heritage. This achievement boosted the youths’ confidence, visibility, and pride in their culture, encouraging continued participation in cultural and community events.

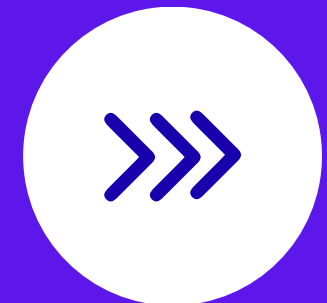

# Mobilization of Fruit-Bearing & Afforestation Plants

With support from the Forest Department, a total of 740 fruit-bearing and afforestation plants were mobilized and distributed across 5 adopted villages to promote environmental sustainability and livelihood support.

# Inauguration of Poultry Farm

Mobilized by CCD, a poultry farm was inaugurated at Gurasahi village, Jeerango Panchayat, by CCD Director Shri A. Jagannatha Raju, with Sarpanch Smt. Rispa Bhuyan as the Chief Guest. The beneficiary, Shri Balaram Sabar, established a 2,000-capacity poultry unit with 600 one-day-old chicks.

The total project cost was ₹7.20 lakh, of which ₹4.32 lakh was received as a government subsidy from the Animal Husbandry Department under the Go-Sugam Scheme. In addition, under the FFVDP, CCD supported instant income generation by providing 100 broiler chicks (28 days old), strengthening the beneficiary's livelihood and promoting sustainable poultry entrepreneurship.

# EMPOWERING YOUTH THROUGH TIMELY CAREER GUIDANCE



Mr. Gorachanda Sabar, a former VDC President, comes from a financially disadvantaged family of small-scale farmers. Despite limited resources, he completed his Higher Secondary (+2) education at a local government college. After graduation, however, he faced uncertainty and lacked awareness of employment opportunities, a common challenge among rural youth.

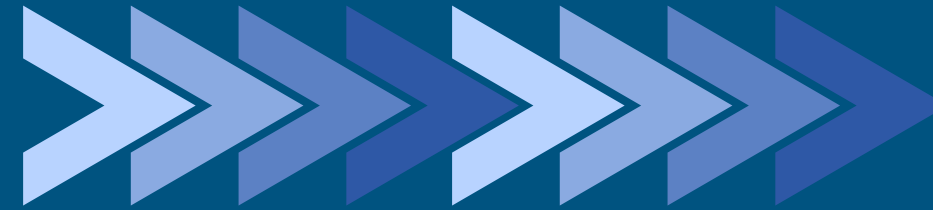
Recognizing this gap, the FFVDP team conducted a dedicated career counselling session, encouraging educated youth to participate in the District-Level Job Fair Mela. With end-to-end guidance and registration support from FFVDP staff, Gorachanda appeared for interviews and was successfully selected as a Relationship Officer at Muthoot Microfinance Ltd. Today, he earns a stable income, has gained social recognition, and actively motivates other village youths—demonstrating how timely guidance, access to information, and community support can transform rural livelihoods.

# LIVELIHOOD IMPROVEMENT THROUGH PETTY SHOP SUPPORT

Under the FFVDP livelihood initiative, a vulnerable family from Tala Galaganda received ₹70,000 financial support, disbursed in two phases to strengthen their petty shop. The support was utilized for purchasing additional stock, minor infrastructure improvements (shelves, counter, signboard), and better product display, making the shop more customer-friendly and profitable.

Within a few months, the shop began generating regular profits, enabling the family to reinvest earnings and, with a small interest-based loan, purchase an auto-rickshaw. This led to income diversification, shifting the family from a single income source to dual income streams (petty shop + transport service). The auto-rickshaw now supports local mobility for villagers, including school children, small traders, and emergency travel, while providing self-employment to a family member. The intervention strengthened economic security, confidence, and community recognition, demonstrating how small, guided investments can create sustainable livelihoods.

# LIVELIHOOD ENHANCEMENT THROUGH POULTRY SUPPORT



Under the livelihood enhancement initiative, Ms. Sabita Bhuyan received 50 vaccinated chicks (28 days old) along with poultry medicines and a 3-month supply of feed. With regular guidance and follow-up from the project team, she successfully managed the birds, ensuring good health and high survival rates.

Within 3 months, Sabita sold 12 grown birds in the local market, earning ₹5,600. Demonstrating strong financial decision-making, she reinvested ₹5,000 of her earnings to purchase a goat kid, thereby diversifying her livelihood sources. This intervention improved her household income stability, strengthened asset creation, and laid the foundation for sustainable income generation through integrated livestock rearing.

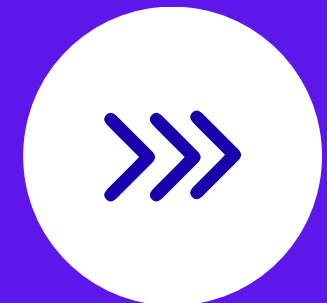

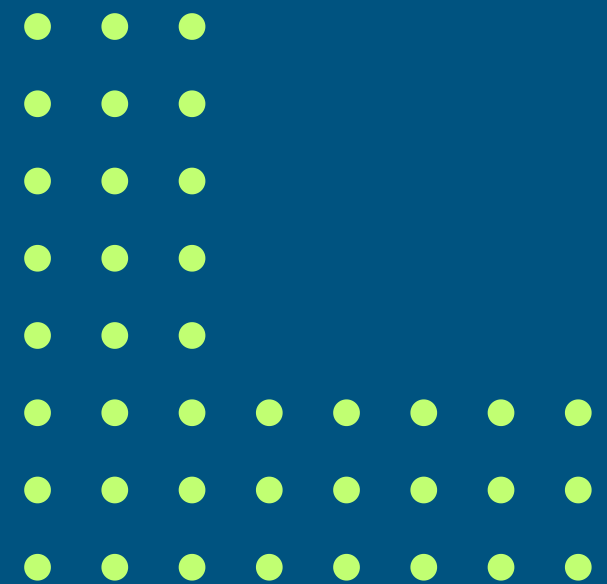

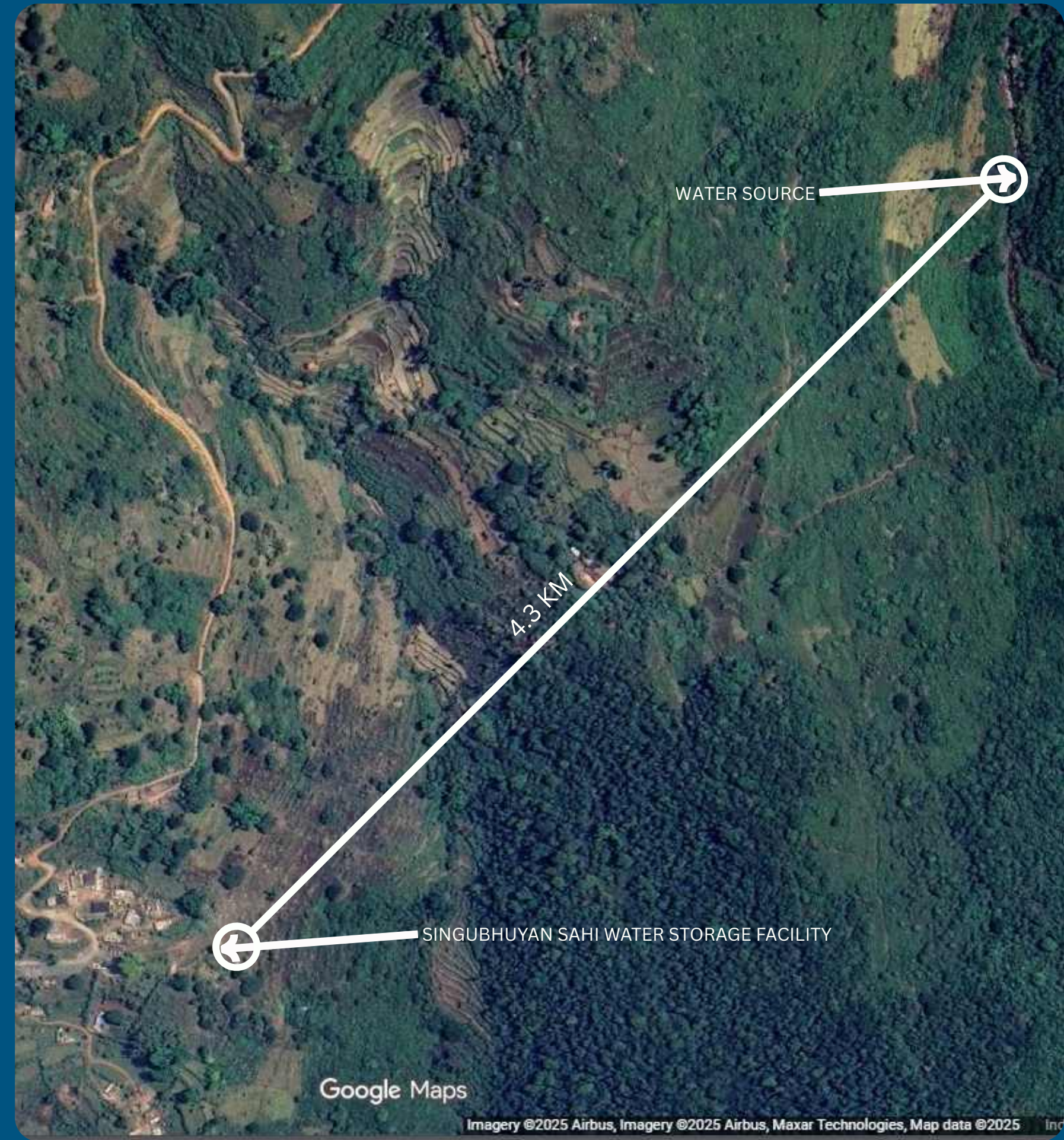
# GRAVITY FLOW CONSTRUCTION SINGUBHUYAN SAHI

The Singubhuyan Sahi Water Storage Facility comprises four (4) water storage tanks, each with a capacity of 5,000 liters, resulting in a total storage capacity of 20,000 liters for the village.

Water is conveyed from a perennial source through a 4.3 km gravity flow pipeline, laid across dense forest cover and rocky terrain. The pipeline was installed using multiple coupling joints to ensure strength, flexibility, and uninterrupted water flow over the challenging landscape.



The system operates with a natural elevation gradient of over 3,050 feet (≈930+ meters) between the source and the village, enabling efficient gravity-based water transmission without the need for pumps or external energy.



# GRAVITY FLOW CONSTRUCTION SARGI SAHI



The Sargi Sahi Water Storage Facility has been developed under the Safe and Clean Drinking Water (Gravity Flow) project to ensure reliable access to safe drinking water for the habitation.

Water is conveyed from a perennial source located on a different hill, through a 2.7 km-long gravity flow pipeline. Due to the significant elevation difference, with the water storage facility situated at a lower altitude than the source, water flows freely and with strong pressure without the use of pumps or external energy.

The natural gravitational force enables smooth, continuous, and high-volume water flow, ensuring consistent supply even during peak usage periods.

The facility consists of four (4) storage tanks, each with a capacity of 5,000 liters, providing a total storage capacity of 20,000 liters for the village. This storage system ensures adequate buffering and uninterrupted availability of water for all households.

The gravity-based design makes the system energy-efficient, low-maintenance, and sustainable, strengthening long-term water security for the residents of Sargi Sahi.

# BOREWELL WITH OVERHEAD WATER STORAGE CONSTRUCTION AT UPPARA GALAGANDA

At Uppara Galaganda, a single overhead water storage tank with a capacity of 5,000 liters has been successfully installed to ensure a reliable and sustainable drinking water supply for the community.



Water is efficiently pumped from a depth of 280 feet below ground level using a 1 kW motor pump. The system is powered by two solar panels with a combined generation capacity of 1,165 watts, enabling the facility to operate on renewable energy.

Under well-lit daylight conditions, the solar-powered system functions smoothly and efficiently, successfully lifting water from the deep bore source and filling the entire tank without interruption. The system demonstrates strong performance and reliability, meeting the community's daily water requirements effectively.

This installation stands as a successful example of renewable energy-based water infrastructure, reducing dependency on conventional power sources while ensuring uninterrupted access to safe drinking water for the village.



# GENERAL HEALTH CHECK-UP CAMP

A General Health Camp was organized at Singubhuyansahi with participation from 135 community members, including children, adolescents, women, and elderly. Specialists from GEMS, Srikakulam – Medical Officer, Ophthalmologist, and Dental Surgeon – conducted physical check-ups, eye examinations, and dental consultations. The camp aimed at providing focused, quality care, along with awareness on health maintenance. CCD's Director was present during the event.



## Numerical Outcomes & Outputs:

- Total participants: 135
- Eye check-ups: Vision issues identified; 5 referred for higher treatment
- Dental check-ups: Oral hygiene awareness provided; pain and infection cases addressed
- General check-ups: Blood pressure, fever, and weakness assessed
- Medicines distributed: Free medicines to all participants

# GENERAL HEALTH CHECKUP CAMP

A comprehensive General Health Check-up Camp was successfully organized at Singubhuyan Sahi, Tala Galaganda, and Sana Tapanga, benefiting 435 community members. The camp provided multi-specialty health services, including general health screening, eye care, dental check-ups, dermatology (skin) consultations, anemia testing, and blood pressure monitoring.

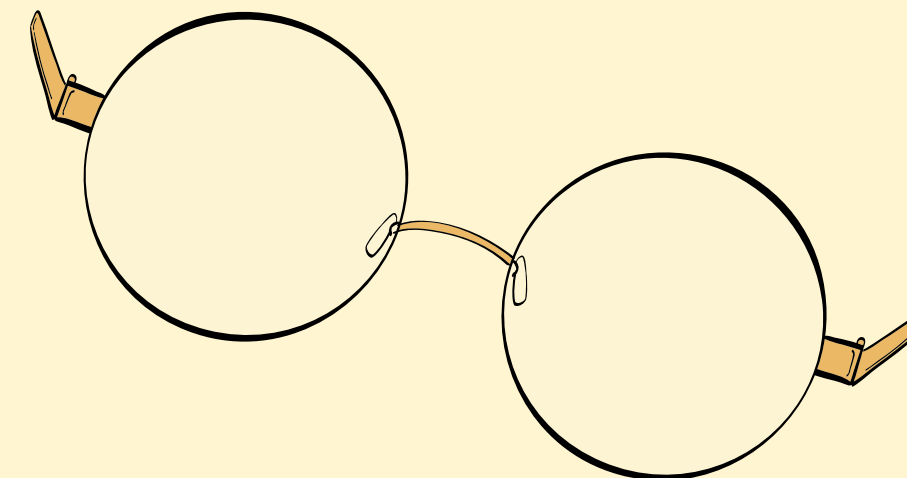

Hemoglobin testing was conducted using standard medical kits, including digital hemoglobinometers, ensuring accuracy through trained medical staff and lab technicians. A total of 108 individuals participated, including women (especially adolescents and pregnant women), children, and elderly persons who are at higher risk of anemia. Among them, 58 participants were identified with low hemoglobin levels and were provided free Raj Iron tablets and Raj Alben syrup. Additionally, 28 individuals were referred to Government Health Centers for further medical care or linked to nutrition and supplementation programs such as iron-folic acid distribution, dietary counselling, and the local VHND program.



# EMPOWERING ADOLESCENT GIRLS THROUGH HEALTH & HYGIENE AWARENESS (HC 3 UB)

Under the FFVDP initiative, Adolescent Girls Groups across 7 villages have been conducting monthly meetings focused on Menstrual Health Management (MHM), personal hygiene, nutrition, and balanced diet. Each session engaged an average of 10–15 participants, including adolescent girls and young women, creating a safe space for open discussion and learning.



Through these regular meetings, 140 members gained improved knowledge and confidence on menstrual health practices, including awareness and correct use of sanitary pads and reusable sanitary pads. The initiative has strengthened health awareness, hygienic practices, and peer support, contributing to healthier habits and reduced stigma around menstruation within the community.



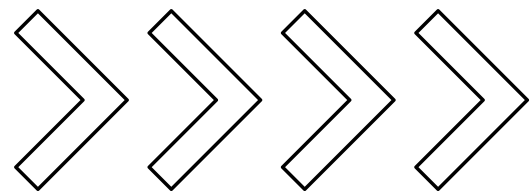

# COMMUNITY CLEANING DRIVES

Following community meetings, residents from 7 villages collectively initiated monthly village clean-up drives. Community members actively clean household surroundings, collect solid waste, and dispose it in a designated community pit. This initiative has significantly improved village cleanliness, hygiene awareness, and community ownership.

# CONSTRUCTION OF A FUNCTIONAL TOILET FOR IMPROVED DIGNITY & HEALTH

Samanath Bhuyan's family lived in a pucca house under Indira Awas Yojana, but without a toilet facility, forcing them to practice open defecation, posing serious health, hygiene, and safety risks, especially for women and children. Through FFVDP-CCD awareness meetings with CBOs and community members, sanitation and the importance of functional toilets were emphasized as a key healthcare priority.

Motivated by these sessions, Samanath took personal initiative and invested ₹9,000 from his own savings to construct a functional household toilet. The toilet is now regularly used by all family members, significantly improving health, safety, privacy, and dignity, particularly for his wife and daughters. This intervention has contributed to a cleaner living environment and stands as a strong example of how awareness-led behaviour change can result in sustainable sanitation outcomes.



# HOUSING SUPPORT FOR A VULNERABLE FAMILY AFTER CYCLONE

Sarat Bhuyan's family was living in a small and unsafe house, which was completely damaged during the severe cyclone in October 2025. With limited income from small-scale farming, the family was forced to survive for nearly one month in a temporary kutcha shelter made of mud, bamboo, and tarpaulin, exposing them to serious health and safety risks during the rainy and winter season.



## UB & UP

Recognizing the crisis, the Sahid Laxman Nayak VDC, community members, and the FFVDP-CCD Household Care Project Officer jointly discussed the case and submitted a formal petition to the Panchayat through the VDC. Following a field verification by Panchayat officials, housing support was approved, and house construction work was initiated within 2-3 weeks. The ongoing construction has restored dignity, safety, and hope for the family, highlighting the impact of community-led action and timely institutional response.
